



ST CHARLES HIGH SCHOOL & SUCCESS CAMPUS

St. Charles Presbyterian Church has supported our local high school for many years, and currently works with the counseling staff to support students in need of school supplies, clothing, snacks, and monthly notes of encouragement for their most vulnerable students. In recent years, we have supported their Success Campus, as well.



The Success Campus was started in 1987 with grant money and was created specifically for students who had fallen behind in credits, or simply worked better in a small environment. They originally supported students from Orchard Farms, Francis Howell, and Ft. Zumwalt, who each went on to start their own programs based on the model of Success Campus. Currently, they have 80 students enrolled, spending half or full days at their location across from the high school. Our H2O Committee has supported them as well through the years with small treats at Halloween, a hot cocoa bar during finals week before winter break, an end-of-the year treat, and snacks and other supplies throughout the year. SCHS and Success Campus are very appreciative of our help and grateful for our working relationship of care for all of their students, and especially the most at risk ones. Thank you for your generosity to them!

An Investment Opportunity

Our church has a building loan, also called a mortgage, with the Presbyterian Investment and Loan Program (PILP). This organization operates much like a savings and loan company where individuals and organizations can invest their money and get paid interest in return. Then PILP turns around and uses this money to make building loans to churches. SCPC got such a loan from PILP to fund the construction of our building addition and elevator. So PILP offers investments to the public to help generate the funds it can then lend to churches. Did you know that you can invest your own money with PILP? Several individual members of SCPC are already doing this. And a portion of the SCPC Legacy Fund is also invested at PILP. These investments work like certificates of deposits (CD's) in that they are for a fixed length of time and they pay a fixed rate of interest. Terms available are as short as 6 months and as long as 5 years. At the time of this writing, PILP has a special offering of a 15 month note that is paying a 3.4% annual yield when the interest is reinvested.

There is a \$500 minimum if you want to invest in one of PILP's notes. You can chose to have the interest paid out to you quarterly or you can have it reinvested to earn a higher, compounded interest rate. The money you invest is your money and will always be your money, just like any other certificate of deposit investment you might make. When the investment term is over, the money is returned to you, or you can roll it over into a new investment if you want. By investing in PILP, you are helping the church in two ways. First,

By investing in PILP, you are helping the church in two ways. First, you will help PILP make loans available to other churches for their building needs. Second, you will help SCPC get the best possible interest rate and thereby reduce the interest cost on our building loan. That's why whenever you make an investment with PILP you are asked if you would like to support a particular church so it can get the best interest rate on its loan.

If are interested in investing with PILP or have any questions about their program, please ask a member of the Stewardship, Budget & Finance Committee and we'll be glad to help you.

Update from the Pastor Transition Task Force

Late last year, Rev. Ronnie gave a gift to St. Charles Presbyterian Church when he announced that he'd be retiring sometime in the second half of 2024. The gift is NOT that he's leaving us! Rather, he has given us the gift of time to better prepare for the transition to a new pastor. As many of you know because you have lived through this transition process before, it can be very involved and takes quite a bit of time. So it is indeed a remarkable gift that pastor Ronnie has given us. Many pastors will not announce their leaving until just before it happens and this usually forces their church into a long period with an interim pastor. Please join us in thanking Ronnie for his wisdom and his caring for our church in this important way, as well as throughout all of his ministry among us.

In January of this year, the Session appointed a Pastor Transition Task Force (PTTF) to begin the work of discovering how best to use this gift. The PTTF first met with a recently retired pastor, who had been through a similar situation where their retirement plans were known well in advance, so we could learn about our options and opportunities.

Also in the Spring, we contacted the Stated Clerk of Presbytery, Rev. Joy Myers, to inform her of pastor Ronnie's stated intention for retirement and our desire to begin the process of calling a new pastor. This then led to a contact with the Moderator of the Presbytery's Commission on Ministry, Rev. Ellen Gurnon, since the COM will be our partner in this process.

One of the key steps in this process is for us as a congregation to complete a mission study. The Presbytery requires congregations to complete a mission study during pastor transitions to help congregations clarify their mission and purpose. The report that comes out of the study helps to define the needs for the future pastoral leadership. Even though a mission study and report are typically not completed until after a pastor resigns, we are planning to move forward with a mission discernment program in October. This program will involve every member of the congregation in a scripture-based process to answer the questions of "Who are we?" to set our historical context, "Where are we?" to establish our current context, and "Where do we believe God is calling us?" to reestablish our vision and mission.

At its regular August meeting the Session approved the program for our mission study and selected the dates for the congregational discernment process. We are blessed to have the assistance and expertise of our friend, the Rev. Dr. Bart Brenner, who brings to us a wealth of experience with discernment processes such as this. He is sharing the materials that he has developed over his career and will help lead us through the process. It is a three week program that will start on Sunday, October 1st, and end on Sunday, October 22nd. Contained within these three weeks is a two -week period of individual discernment through meditation on scripture passages. On the last Sunday, we will work together to assemble all the thoughts and ideas that emerged for each of us through this discernment process, and they will serve as the input for the Session's Study Team and its Mission Report. The Session will circulate a draft of the report for further input from the congregation before it is approved by the Session and eventually submitted to the Presbytery's COM. We look forward to all of us coming together to discern where God is calling us to go and who God is calling us to be as a church. We hope that every member of our congregation will participate and share their ideas and visions for the future of St. Charles Presbyterian Church. In the meantime, if you have guestions about this process, please reach out to one of us on the Task Force or any member of Session.
